Hi Katie,

Ross is correct. No nav lights should be along the walkway.

If there are any nav lights they should be two red lights fixed (ie not flashing) vertically one above the other.

However, due to the remote location, and lack of water and water traffic, it would be sufficient to have down lighting spaced along the walkway, and on the pontoon ends.

The large white flood light needs to be positioned so as not to shine out and blind approaching vessels. Ie can also be a downlight facing inwards.

Work on the basis if the structure can be seen, there is no need to put nav lights on it.
