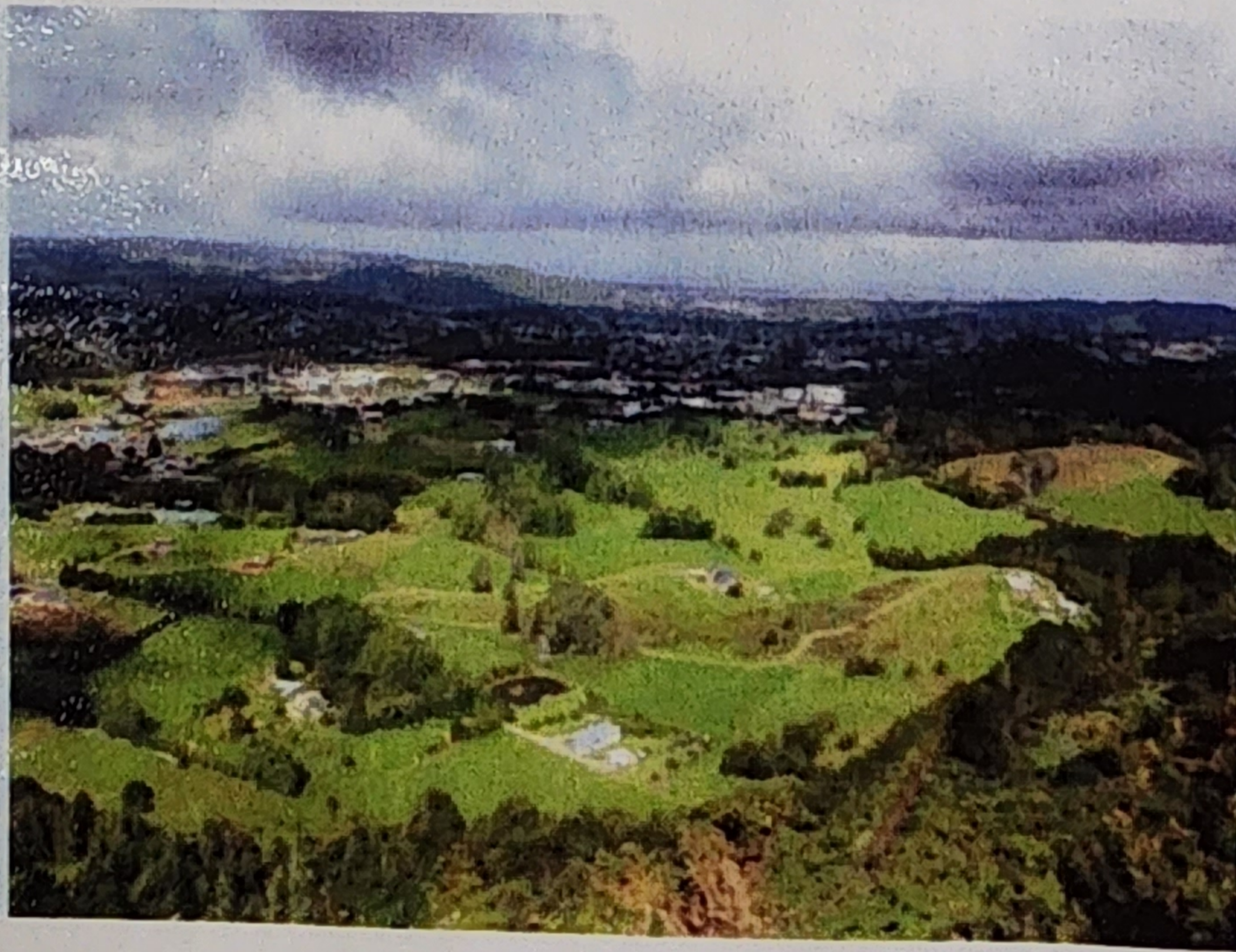

# PARIKIORE



## VIEW FROM PARIKIORE



**Kaikōrero:** Waimarie Bruce, Ruiha Collier

**Wai Numbers:** WAI 619, 1524

Parikiore once dominated the northern skyline with Whangarei and for the Ngati Kahu o Tonga. With six other hills encapsulated within the entire formation in a semi-circle around a swamp basin area where our place is.

The lands were lost via forced takings relating to quarries and railways.

**Wai Numbers:** WAI 619, 1524

Tupua is a place of the soda springs (geothermal area). These springs were used as an area of recovery after the war and medicinal purposes. However now we cannot use this area as it has been built on (Springs Flat).

The Waitaua Awa starts from this side of Parikiore. These waters are important for Te Kamo and Pukeariki.

## HURUPAKI

Respite – recovery – with mana  
A portion of this land was sold  
to Hone Heke as a reward for  
the tupuna Tāmaki.

## KETENIKAU

**Wai Numbers:** WAI 619, 1524

Te Puia remains are in a torere  
held inside a whale bone crypt.

This was a main settlement (post  
1840) for Maori in Whangarei, as  
many of the lands were tuku to  
Carruth.

Mere Wharenikau is a major  
tupuna in these lands.

## LAKE OARA

Red Ochre (kokowai) war paint and used for burial purposes is located here.

Still in Maori ownership, through a Ngati Kahu Hapu Reserve.

## PUKEMIRO

**Wai Numbers:** WAI 619, 1524

Block adjoins the Whauwhau and Pukemiro.

Pukemiro has a puna which flows towards Onoke, and is significant to whanau of Ngati Kahu.
